- *Could you update that with the last financial year's figures – 2024-25 – for tables 1,2,3,4 & 6?*
- *For tables 3 and six, would it also be possible to provide figures for the last three financial years only – 2022-23 to 2024-25?*

Our Response

Thank you for your request for information. Please note we only hold the details of claims (and some incidents) notified to us. Please note we only hold claims information for England and not the rest of the UK.

Due to low volumes, we have aggregated the data for the breakdown by Trusts requested rather than broken down by year, in order to provide meaningful data.

Please note: We have recently changed the way we report on our FOIs to align better with our published documents. Streamlining our reporting on FOIs with our annual published reports may mean a variation in snapshot dates. This means this data may not align with previous similar requests and it may not be possible for you to compare this information with a previous request. Claims notified/received in any given year will often relate to incidents that have occurred many years prior. Due to the nature of clinical negligence claims and the level of investigation needed to bring them to a resolution, claims received and notified in a specific year may take years to settle and close. They are not guaranteed to be settled and closed in the same year. As such, there will be a time gap between incident and claim closure.

Due to the way in which data is extracted, it is also possible that the same claim may appear more than once in a dataset, across different year groups e.g. where the case

has been closed (as nil damages payment), challenged, reopened, and closed again at conclusion.

Please note in respect of the data provided the perpetrator is not necessarily a clinician.

The information provided includes details of all clinical claims including those arising under the General Practice Indemnity Schemes Clinical Negligence Scheme for General Practice (CNSGP), and Existing Liabilities Scheme for General Practice (ELSGP). Please note Claims recorded against the Department of Health and Social Care (showing as Department of Health) are liabilities arising from defunct NHS organisations, which transferred to the Secretary of State for Health and Social Care when those organisations were abolished. These also include NHS clinical negligence claims made against current and former GP members of medical defence organisations (currently MDDUS and MPS only) in respect of liabilities incurred before 1 April 2019. These are managed under ELSGP. Please see our website for details.

The NHS Resolution Directions 2013 and The NHS Resolution (Amendment)

Direction 2013 directed NHS Resolution to handle and pay certain clinical claims where liability has transferred to the Secretary of State for Health and Social Care from abolished Primary Care Trusts (PCTs) and Strategic Health Authorities (SHAs). NHS Resolution was also directed to handle and pay claims against Public Health England. This “Scheme” is used to identify such claims and includes the majority of incidents which occurred prior to 01.04.13 for services provided by PCTs, some independent providers and SHAs.

Low figures refusal

We have not provided the information for low figures involved (or high numbers that make it possible to work out what the low number is), as we believe that disclosure of information with this level of granularity is exempt under Section 40(2) by virtue of section 40(3A) (a) of the FOI Act, where disclosure to a member of the public would contravene one or more of the data protection principles. The data protection principles are set out in Article 5 of the General Data Protection Regulation. We take the view that it would not be fair or lawful (given the sensitive and confidential nature of the information held) to disclose such information and any disclosure would therefore contravene the first data protection principle.

In some instances, the low numbers of claims (fewer than 5) in each category, the likelihood exists that individuals who are the subject of this information may be identified either from this information alone, or in combination with other available information. In addition to this, as this information is considered to be sensitive personal data (the data subjects’ medical condition); NHS Resolution believes it has a greater responsibility to protect those individuals’ identities, as disclosure could potentially cause damage and/or distress to those involved.

Further to our obligations to provide advice and assistance, you may find it helpful to review the work of the [Getting It Right First Time team](#) with whom NHS Resolution has been working with to undertake in-depth analysis of our claims data. They have

produced a number of [reports](#) from analysing our claims data, which has been shared following approval of the confidentiality advisory group to the use of confidential patient information for this purpose.

This concludes our response to your request.

If you are not satisfied with the service that you have received in response to your information request, it is open to you to make a complaint and request a formal review of our decisions. If you choose to do this, you should write to [Joanne Appleby](#), Deputy Data Protection Officer for NHS Resolution, within 28 days of your receipt of this reply. Reviews of decisions made in relation to information requests are carried out by a person who was not involved in the original decision-making about the request.

If you are not content with the outcome of your complaint, you may apply directly to the Information Commissioner for a review of the decision.
